




















Edison Chouest, Sr. purchases the 65-foot utility vessel HOLIDAY, and Edison Chouest Boat Rental is established.

North American Shipbuilding opens in Larose, Louisiana.



ECO's fleet grows to 12: three large cargo, eight utility and one tugboat.



The ECO/Ulstein joint venture Island Offshore Shipholding, LP is created. ECO breaks ground on Navship in Navegantes, Brazil.



The 348-foot M/V LANEY CHOUEST, the world's largest and most powerful anchor handling towing supply vessel, is launched. All nine slips of C-Port 2 are completed.



ECO creates Marine Technologies, with offices in Louisiana, Norway, Singapore and Brazil. ECO's ITS 100, a bow steering module, is named Workboat Magazine's "Boat of the Year."



ECO acquires Martin Terminal in Port Fourchon.



Navship launches its first vessel, NAVEGANTES PRIDE. M/V SEA VENTURE, a 348-foot survey support ship, is delivered to Northrop Grumman.



ECO delivers four LNG tractor tugs to Cheniere Energy at Sabine Pass, Texas. C-Innovation is founded and headquartered in Mandeville, Louisiana.



ECO purchases former Bender shipyard in Tampa, Florida; renamed Tampa Ship. ECO breaks ground on the company's largest shipyard, LaShip, in Houma, Louisiana.

ECO's first highly specialized newbuild is delivered — the 200-foot dive support vessel M/V LOOP LIFTER.



ECO launches M/V DINO CHOUEST, the company's first multipurpose dynamically positioned vessel.



ECO delivers the largest water throw capacity firefighting vessel in the U.S. fleet M/V DAMON CHOUEST — also the world's first floating production system installation vessel.



ECO delivers the first commercial U.S.-built icebreaking research ship, the NATHANIEL B. PALMER.



C-Logistics is created. The first three slips of C-Port 2 open in Port Fourchon.

C-Innovation expands subsea construction operations and opens Houston, Texas, office. ECO opens LaShip in Houma, Louisiana — ECO's





Gary Chouest receives the Lifetime Achievement Award at Offshore Support Journal's annual conference in London.































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
